

# Work begins in earnest on your new Country Park


This is the third newsletter produced to keep you updated on the progress of The Wick Country Park. As some of you may have noticed work has been progressing steadily since the last newsletter and we have plenty of news to report. During the next few months the changes on site will be even more dramatic with the start of the major landscaping and tree planting.

The details of the work already carried out, in progress now and starting soon can be found in the next few pages. There is also information on guided site visits, volunteering opportunities and Countryside Service contacts, so please read on!

# The current situation

The access road to the Country Park from Tresco Way has now been installed. This has allowed contractors working on the next stages of the project to move onto the site. The cattle grids on the farm road before the

main entrance to the site have also been realigned, which will allow safer access to the site for pedestrians and disabled users when it opens.

New electricity cables have now been laid underground from the main entrance at Tresco Way to the hedgerow on the southern site boundary. They replace the existing cables, which run north-south across the site on wooden pylons.

### Future Work

The entrance road and associated verges will be further enhanced next year after the heavy machinery has finished work on site. Now that new electricity cables have been installed underground the redundant lines crossing the site can be taken down. The underground cables will mean improved visual attractiveness for the site and will also remove a flight hazard for the larger birds such as geese and swans which we hope to attract to the new five acre lake. Kite flying and angling will now also be possible on this part of the site without the danger of hitting the cables.

Some of the cable poles may be left standing to allow nest boxes to be erected. The poles will also serve as excellent perches for birds of prey such as kestrels and owls.

The lake construction has begun and will be completed by early spring. In addition, a weir will be installed in the North Benfleet Brook that runs through the site to create a large holding pond. The pond will not only enhance the diversity of habitats for plants and animals, it will also provide a valuable water reserve that can be used to top up the new lake when needed. Several crossing points over the stream will also be installed. These will allow access for pedestrians to the eastern part of the site and one will be a vehicle bridge enabling machinery to cross for habitat management work. At the northern end of the brook a wet woodland will be created. This will consist of trees such as alder that form woodland known as 'carr'. A boardwalk will also be installed allowing pedestrians to cross the stream through the wood without getting their feet wet.

The excavated material from the lake will be placed in the northwest corner of the main meadow. The material will be contoured and thousands of trees planted creating large mixed woodland. Any remaining material from the excavation will be used to enhance the landscaping on either side of the access road and trees and shrubs will be planted to provide an attractive entrance to the park.

The Education and Information Pavilion has now been granted planning permission with Pavilion construction set to begin early in the New Year. The car park and entrance gates will be installed shortly after.

As you can appreciate, the next few months will see a great many changes on site. There will be a lot of heavy machinery moving around, and together with the lake excavation and pavilion construction will mean the site will remain closed to public access for some time. We would be grateful if parents and guardians would remind their children not to go onto the site until the official opening, which should be in late spring 2002. There will be opportunities for supervised site visits before the opening, details of which can be found below.

### Volunteer Work

After the construction of the lake it will be possible for us to take volunteer work parties onto site, initially to carry out tree planting.

The areas to be planted include the

new wood in the northwest corner of the main meadow, the wet woodland in the northeast corner of the site, the area around the new lake, and the bunds that run along the access roads. As the project progresses there will be other opportunities to help out with the work on site. If you would like to become involved with the practical work parties, or with a community group to help manage the Country Park then please contact PAUL BOWN, the Countryside Ranger, at the number below.

#### Site Visits
